Mission District Specific Plan Completed

After three years of community and stakeholder meetings, and City Council and Planning Commission public hearings, the 200-page *Mission District Specific Plan* has been completed and is available online at www.sangabrielcity.org. The final plan is pending public hearing before the Council as this issue of the Grapevine goes to press.

The *Mission District Specific Plan* states how the goals of San Gabriel's new general plan will be implemented. Specific plans are not redevelopment areas. The *Mission District Specific Plan* instead proposes strategies for economic development, land use

and zoning, historic preservation and cultural resources, urban design, architectural design, and the circulation of people and cars to set the stage for revitalizing the Mission District.

The final document was made possible with the support of the community and City Council. Funding was provided by the State of California Department of Housing and Community Development Downtown Rebound Grant and the Federal Community Development Block Grant. General Plan Creating New Vision For City

"Ingredients for Success," San Gabriel's first new General Plan in 14 years, envisions the San Gabriel of tomorrow! Over the past four years, residents, business people and City staff worked closely together to formulate a General Plan adopted by the City Council on May 18. The plan outlines how the City will deal with such issues as housing, economic development, land use, mobility and open space over the next 10-15 years. The plan also includes policies and programs designed to make San Gabriel an even better place to live, work and play.

In addition to the General Plan, detailed plans are underway for three important areas of the city: the Mission District, Valley Boulevard, and Las Tunas Drive. Each of these plans will complement the General Plan and build on the strengths and address recommended areas of improvement in each of these areas.

The *Mission District Specific Plan* has been underway since 2002 and is designed to create a livable "village" atmosphere while stimulating economic vitality in the City's oldest district.

The *Valley Boulevard Neighborhoods Sustainability Plan*, or *Valley Vision* for short, is the first comprehensive plan dealing exclusively with this important area of the City. When completed, the plan will point the way to making the Valley Boulevard neighborhood a "sustainable" place — environmentally sustainable, economically sustainable and functionally sustainable.

Two rounds of public input have now been completed, as the City's team of staff and consultants has met with "stakeholders" in the neighborhood, including residents, businesspeople, architects and Realtors. These gatherings have resulted in some very valuable community input on such issues as traffic and transportation, land use, urban design and infrastructure — input critical to the plan's success.

Work is now underway on an environmental impact report that will be completed this fall. Planning Commission and City Council public hearings on *Valley Vision* are expected to take place by the end of the year.

Protecting Your Family from West Nile Virus



While summer means baseball, fun at the beach and vacations with the kids, it's also the prime season for mosquitoes. The West Nile virus (WNV) was first found in mosquitoes and birds in California in 2003. The virus is transmitted to people by infected mosquitoes. Mild symptoms may include fever, headache, body aches, nausea, a skin rash on the trunk of the body, and/or swollen lymph nodes. If you think you have been bitten by a mosquito and experience these symptoms, please seek medical attention immediately.

The San Gabriel Valley Mosquito & Vector Control District routinely surveys for mosquito-borne diseases such as West Nile. Adult mosquitoes are routinely trapped and tested. The District also provides free home and yard inspections for mosquito sources, as well as mosquito fish to interested residents for placement in ponds, water gardens and watering troughs.

You can protect your family from WNV by doing the following:

- ~ Avoid outdoor activity at dawn and dusk during mosquito season (now to October).
- ~ Wear loose-fitting long pants and long-sleeve shirts when outdoors.
- ~ Use approved mosquito repellents containing DEET.
- ~ Stock large troughs with mosquito fish and clean small containers weekly.
- ~ Properly maintain swimming pools, wading pools and spas.
- ~ Drain all standing water on property.
- ~ Ensure doors and windows have tight-fitting screens in good repair.
- ~ Clean and change birdbaths once a week.
- ~ Regularly clean rain gutters of debris to prevent water from puddling.
- ~ Seal septic tank covers and other openings tightly to prevent adult mosquitoes from entering to lay eggs.
- ~ Repair broken or leaking faucets and watering equipment.

Temporary Canopy Structures



The San Gabriel City Council adopted a new ordinance effective March 6 dealing with temporary structures, which include canopies, carports, or tent-like structures made from cloth, vinyl or plastic. These structures are not attached to the ground by means of a foundation like a regular building. Under the new law, temporary structures are prohibited in any zone in the City if they are located in the front yard, in the street-side yard of a corner lot, or anywhere they are visible from the public right of way. Temporary structures not meeting these criteria are permitted, provided they comply with applicable setback and lot coverage requirements.

The intent of the new law, written in response to resident concerns, is to protect the appearance of the City. Many other cities in California have adopted similar restrictions on temporary structures. Property owners who have existing temporary structures that do not comply with the new regulations should have received a letter from the City informing them of the new law and providing them with a copy of it. Property owners with nonconforming existing structures are required to either remove them or relocate them to comply with the new law.

Fire Department Dispatching System Facilitates Quick Response

When you call the San Gabriel Fire Department, a staff of highly trained fire and rescue dispatchers from the Verdugo Fire Communications Center handles your inquiry.

Prior to joining the Verdugo Fire Communications Center in April 2000, the Fire Department operated with a firefighter/dispatcher; a firefighter assigned at the start of each shift also handled dispatcher duties.

With San Gabriel's inclusion in the Verdugo dispatching system, dispatchers with years of experience have now assumed these duties.


The City now shares dispatching service costs with eight other cities. Benefits include common radio frequencies for easy communication, alarms broadcast into each station with hard copies of the response information on station printers, printouts on the Mobile Computer Terminals on the vehicles, current hospital status for paramedic transports, and a statistical analysis of the year's emergency calls at year's end.

With inclusion into the Verdugo system, San Gabriel became a partner with the following cities: Burbank, Glendale, Pasadena, San Marino, South Pasadena, Arcadia, Sierra Madre, and Monrovia. There are a total of 33 fire stations in the Verdugo system, including 33 engines, nine truck companies, 18 paramedic rescues, one paramedic squad, and assorted air units, Hazmat and Urban Search & Rescue units, and command vehicles.

As part of the Verdugo system, San Gabriel units can have another jurisdiction's resources assigned to help at a San Gabriel emergency.

Some notable statistics: Last year the Verdugo dispatchers answered over 98,000 calls; 51,441 generated responses for Verdugo agencies. Dispatchers also translated calls in 14 languages. They typically answer 11.3 calls and handle almost six emergency incidents per hour. The average duration of a call is 66 seconds, and they are answered 95 percent of the time in less than six seconds. It takes 42 seconds to process a 911 call, and after it is sent to the radio dispatcher it takes only 8.3 seconds to dispatch the units.


Come Tour the Civic Auditorium



Del Mar Alhambra Bridge Design Update

The Los Angeles County Public Works Department-Design Division has completed its analysis of the bridge at Del Mar Avenue over the Alhambra Wash.



The existing bridge, built in 1939, is approaching the end of its useful life. It was designed for lighter truckloads than today's design standards, which is 25 percent heavier than the design for the existing bridge. The maintenance costs are higher for repainting the existing steel bridge. The existing bridge's steel frame members could be very expensive. A new bridge has been designed to current seismic design loads and truckloads. The bridge replacement cost is more than a standard bridge widening. However, the age of the structure, the long-term maintenance costs on the existing bridge and its low truckload capacity justify its replacement.



In conjunction with the proposed bridge replacement project on Del Mar Avenue, City staff and the Los Angeles County Public Works Department-Design Division have investigated realigning Dewey Avenue at Commercial Center to create a four-way intersection. Caltrans has indicated they may have safety funding that would offset the cost of realigning Dewey to make a safer intersection.

The City Engineer will be setting up a meeting so that residents may express their opinion. Some residents of the Norwood-Strathmore area have voiced concerns about access and traffic circulation in their area, but others may have concerns about increasing traffic along Dewey Avenue.

Fire Department Awarded Homeland Security Grant Funds

The San Gabriel Fire Department has been tentatively approved for \$287,000 in Homeland Security Grant funding. Approximately \$172,000 is earmarked for Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) equipment, to go on a new USAR vehicle. The USAR vehicle was approved last year with 2003 Homeland Security Grant funds. The remaining \$115,000 will be used for training of personnel in Urban Search and Rescue operations.

To date, this brings the total approved grant funding for the Fire Department from the Department of Homeland Security to \$824,793.56. The funds are to be utilized as follows:

- \$10,298.64 for Personal Protective Equipment and antidotes for chemical agents
- \$397,000 for an Urban Search and Rescue vehicle, which has been ordered and should be delivered by the end of the year
- \$302,494.92 for Urban Search and Rescue Equipment
- \$115,000 for training

Once all equipment and training are in place, the Fire Department will become an area-wide resource for heavy rescue operations with staffing support provided by the Alhambra, Monterey Park and South Pasadena Fire Departments.

Officers Garner Recognition from Mothers Against Drunk Driving

The Los Angeles County Chapter of Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) held the 2003 Law Enforcement Recognition Program on March 25. The program recognizes officers throughout the Los Angeles County area who excel in their efforts to remove drunk drivers from the road.

MADD commends the ongoing efforts of all law enforcement throughout the Los Angeles County area. It recognizes qualifying peace officers with a specially designed recognition certificate and a pin that may be worn on the officer's uniform.

This year, several officers throughout Los Angeles County were recognized, including four from San Gabriel Police Department. Officers Vincent Salazar, Aron Stafford, Robert Barada and Christine Nolasco were all recognized for their efforts in removing drunk drivers from the roads.

Painting the Town – San Gabriel Works Hard to Remove Graffiti

The City of San Gabriel is serious about graffiti removal. Graffiti devalues property and diminishes the beauty of the landscape. It affects our quality of life and detracts from the sense of community enjoyed by the residents of San Gabriel.

What is graffiti?

Graffiti is vandalism. It is any unauthorized description, word, figure or design that is marked, etched, scratched, drawn or painted on any surface without the owner's permission. Graffiti is a crime that is punishable by a court of law as a misdemeanor or even a felony.

How has the City of San Gabriel responded to the issue of graffiti?

Last year, the City contracted with Urban Graffiti Enterprises to provide enhanced graffiti-removal services, including weekly surveys, 24-48-hour response after receipt of a complaint, on-site custom color matching and two-hour response after receipt for removal of any offensive or profane graffiti.

Since the inception of the enhanced graffiti removal program, Urban Graffiti Enterprises has painted or removed approximately 40,000 square feet of graffiti from more than 1,500 sites. For Fiscal Year 2004-05, the budget for graffiti abatement has been increased, showing that San Gabriel is serious about graffiti removal.

A successful graffiti-abatement program uses several strategies in its war against graffiti, including:

- **Rapid Response** — removal or covering of graffiti within 24-48 hours of its appearance or reporting.
- **Reporting Hotlines** — increased and timely reporting is essential to the success of a rapid-response strategy.
- **Vigilance** — is necessary and effective. If a wall is tagged, painted and tagged over and over again, eventually the tagger will go somewhere else or give up.
- **Monitoring** — of frequently targeted or highly vulnerable locations and structures for rapid response.
- **Color-Matching** — matching the color of paint to the existing surface color helps promote a clean community and maintain a better quality of life.

What should you do if you see graffiti on private property or your property is vandalized?

San Gabriel Joins Nationwide Effort to Fight Crime

On Tuesday, August 3, neighborhoods throughout San Gabriel are being invited to join forces with thousands of communities nationwide for San Gabriel's "21st Annual National Night Out" (NNO) crime/drug prevention event. This is the tenth year that San Gabriel has participated in National Night

Out, which is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch (NATW), and co-sponsored locally by the San Gabriel Police Department. It will involve over 9,900 communities from all 50 states, U.S. territories, Canadian cities and military bases around the world. In all, over 35 million people are expected to participate in "America's Night Out Against Crime" on August 3. National Night Out is also supported in part by the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance.

From 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m., residents in neighborhoods throughout San Gabriel will lock their doors, turn on outside lights and spend the evening outside with their neighbors. Many Neighborhood Watch groups throughout San Gabriel will be hosting block parties, cookouts and other activities, and will be visited by police, fire, and City officials. The U.S. Army, U.S. Marine Corps and a local radio station are expected to return again this year.

National Night Out has four objectives: heighten crime- and drug-prevention awareness; generate support and participation in local anti-crime efforts; strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community relations; and send a message to criminals letting them know neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

"National Night Out is an extraordinary way to build neighborhood unity and strengthen police-community partnerships," said San Gabriel Police Chief David A. Lawton. "Neighbors meet neighbors — and citizens and local law enforcement have the opportunity to enhance their relationships. On August 3, we invite all San Gabriel residents to join forces with us to give crime and drugs a going-away party."

PATH Program Now Includes Third-Graders

In 1997, the City of San Gabriel introduced the Progress and Accomplishments Through History (PATH) Program. PATH was developed for fourth-graders, and it combined local government education with the study of California mission history. The program has now been redesigned for third-graders as part of their study of community. PATH provides an opportunity to teach and learn about San Gabriel's rich history and local government services.

The pilot program kickoff consisted of a day of presentations for all third-grade classes at each of the San Gabriel Unified School District (SGUSD) elementary schools — McKinley, Roosevelt, Coolidge, Washington and Wilson, and was well received by over 500 students and their teachers.

During the summer, workshops were held for the 20 employees who volunteered to serve as PATH speakers. Speakers make two visits to their assigned classrooms. The first visit is a slide show that illustrates San Gabriel from early times to the present, after which the students are given a My City San Gabriel handbook. The second visit is a presentation about what the respective speaker does for the City.

San Gabriel is excited to have this opportunity to continue to build on the strong relationship between the City and SGUSD for the betterment of the entire community.

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City Developing Hazard Mitigation Plan


Last April, the San Gabriel City Council passed a resolution establishing support for the development of a hazard mitigation plan. In accordance with requirements of the Federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000, the mitigation plan is designed to ensure the health, safety and welfare of its citizens in the event of a natural disaster.

The Act establishes a national program for pre-disaster mitigation. Cities must prepare and submit a local hazard mitigation plan to qualify for pre- and post-disaster mitigation funds.

Since April, a core group representing a cross-section of individuals and organizations in San Gabriel has formed to review the needs and concerns of all interested groups. The core group keeps participants and the community up to date on the plan, and it includes City staff, the public, local businesses and interest groups.

The deadline for submission of a local disaster mitigation plan to FEMA is November 1, 2004. The plan will first be submitted to the City Council for approval and then to the state Office of Emergency Services for review. The plan will include mitigation activities the City already engages in, and also include any newly proposed mitigation activities.

Two years ago, the City received a grant to develop "livable community" strategies for the Las Tunas Drive corridor. The *Las Tunas Drive Revitalization Strategy* will incorporate recommendations on land use, transportation and traffic-calming measures. It will include a toolkit of strategies tailored to the specific needs of Las Tunas Drive. It will also be accompanied by recommendations for capital improvements necessary to implement the plan. The strategy is being prepared for adoption by the City Council and will be implemented subject to future funding availability.


