

San Gabriel Joins Cities Nationwide For America's Night Out Against Crime

They cook hot dogs and burgers, exchange desserts, paint faces, and meet with city officials, police, fire and military personnel. On Tuesday, August 7, neighborhoods throughout San Gabriel are being invited to join forces with thousands of communities nationwide for the "24th Annual National Night Out" (NNO) crime/drug prevention event. This is the 13th year that San Gabriel will participate in this event. Neighborhood Watch and National Night Out are programs to help make communities safer – and to strengthen police-community partnerships.

From 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m., residents will lock their doors, turn on outside lights and spend the evening outside with their neighbors. Many Neighborhood Watch groups will be hosting block parties, cookouts, and other activities and will be visited by police, fire, city officials, a local radio station, and numerous branches of the armed forces.

"As people become more private we become more vulnerable to crime by not seeing, knowing, or noticing what is normal for our streets and neighborhoods. That is why Neighborhood Watch and National Night Out are so important," said Crime Prevention Officer Alex Acosta.

San Gabriel's Neighborhood Watch Block Captains agree. Russell and Carol Meals from the 800-block of Anderson Way said, "One of the best assets of San Gabriel's Neighborhood Watch Program is the monthly crime reports and newsletters provided by the Crime Prevention Office. These communications provide useful information for our neighborhood as well as advice on what we can all do to help fight crime. National Night Out helps people come together and meet neighbors for the first time."

Block Captains Peggy and Russ Hibbs from the 1200-block of Elm Street added, "Having the Neighborhood Watch program shows solidarity between the police department and the people in the neighborhoods they serve. It empowers citizens to feel they have a role in preventing crime. Neighborhood Watch has certainly made a difference on our block."

These block captains encourage others to join Neighborhood Watch. So on Tuesday, August 7, go out to your front yard as a Neighborhood Watch group, pull out a few chairs, and welcome your neighbors to join you.

"National Night Out is an extraordinary way to build neighborhood unity and strengthen police-community partnerships. Neighbors meet neighbors – and citizens and local law enforcement have the opportunity to enhance their relationships," said Police Chief David A. Lawton. "A safer neighborhood starts with you!"

Tips on Staying Cool This Summer

id you know that during vigorous exercise the human body can lose up to one liter of sweat an hour?

During these hot summer months, it's important to keep ourselves and our loved ones hydrated and protected from the heat.

Our bodies normally shed heat through evaporation of sweat. Ordinarily, this heat-regulating mechanism

works well, but when the body generates more heat than it can release, we become overheated or hypothermic. Exposure to higher temperatures, vigorous activity, or a combination of both can lead to serious medical problems. Illness from heat exposure can take the following three forms:

HEAT CRAMPS

Heat cramps are painful muscle spasms that occur after vigorous exercise. This results from a salt imbalance within our muscle cells and usually is brought on by excessive sweating. Treatment includes removing yourself or others from the hot environment, resting, and drinking fluids.

HEAT EXHAUSTION

Heat exhaustion is caused by excessive heat exposure, stress, and fatigue, which is due to hypovolemia – the loss of water and electrolytes from heavy sweating. Heat exhaustion is the most common serious illness caused by heat. Signs and symptoms can include dizziness, weakness, or faintness with accompanying nausea or headache. Individuals may have cold, pale, clammy skin (internal temperature may be very high). As with any heat-related emergency, remove the individual from the hot environment, peel off excessive layers of clothing, encourage the person to lie down, and if possible sip water.

HEATSTROKE


Heatstroke is the most serious of the three heat-related emergencies. It occurs when the body's normal temperature cannot be sustained and rises to the level where body tissue is destroyed. Individuals with heatstroke will usually have hot, dry skin and, most importantly, experience a change in behavior, which could also lead to unresponsiveness. This of course, is a medical emergency and requires not only the same measures mentioned above, but also aggressive cooling measures and a 911 call.

Keeping yourself hydrated is very important, especially if you work outside. Also, keep in mind that the very young and the elderly cannot tolerate heat as well as others; heat can have a compounding effect on them. Sunny weather is a great time to get outdoors, so remember to be sensible about exerting yourself, rest and drink plenty of water.

Tips

Cchool is out and residents in San Gabriel will be looking for fun ways to cool down as summer temperatures heat up. Whether it's a public pool or your own pool, the city encourages you and your family to keep safety in mind. Here are some basic safety tips:

- → Learn to swim. The best thing anyone can do to stay safe in and around the water is to learn to swim. This includes adults and children. The San Gabriel Parks and Recreation Department offers American Red Cross swim lessons for youth and adults at Smith Park Pool. For more information, interested residents can contact the Parks and Recreation Department.
- → Never leave a child unobserved around water. Your eyes must be on the child at all times. Adult supervision is recommended.
- → Install a phone by the pool or keep a cordless phone nearby so that you can call 911 in an emergency.
- → Learn CPR and insist that babysitters, grandparents, and others who care for your child know CPR.
- → Post CPR instructions and 911 or your local emergency number in the
- → Enclose the pool completely with a five-foot high fence with vertical bars as per the 2001 California Building Code. Openings in the fence should be less than four inches wide at intermediate rails. Alarm devices should be installed at all windows and doors of the pool enclosure.



- → The gate should be self-latching and self-closing.
- → Never leave furniture/objects near the fence that would enable a child to climb over the fence.
- → Always keep basic lifesaving equipment by the pool and know how to use it. Pole, rope, and personal flotation devices are recommended.
- → Keep toys away from the pool when not in use, as these can attract young children into the pool.
- → Pool covers should always be completely removed prior to pool use.
- → If a child is missing, check the pool first. Go to the edge of the pool and scan the entire pool bottom, and surface, as well as the surrounding pool area.

Pool Safety : Correct Signage Helps **Businesses and Residents**

Can Gabriel prides itself as a great place to live, shop, and eat! Like the residential Ocommunity, businesses are equally important and share in the pride of ownership of their shops and storefronts. Summarized below are some of the key sign opportunities that are permitted, and the limits established by the City's sign code ordinance to help advertise merchandise and services.

With few exceptions, all signage, including window signs, requires zoning approval and a sign permit. An application must be completed, fees paid, and plans submitted before a sign permit will be issued (\$60 minimum fee).



WINDOW SIGNS

The San Gabriel Municipal Code limits window signs to three and window signage cannot cover more than 25 percent total frontage glass area, which includes doors consisting of glass. Information pertaining to hours of operation and credit cards are exempt. A single sign indicating if a business is "open" or "closed" is also exempt so long as the sign does not exceed 18" x 24".

PORTABLE SIGNS

Each business in a commercial zone is allowed to display one portable sign. Signs may not exceed a width of 2' 6" and may not be more than four feet high. A business owner who wishes to maintain a portable sign in the public right-of-way must also submit and maintain a public liability insurance policy.

Portable signs cannot: (a) Reduce the walkway or sidewalk clearance to less than 36 inches; (b) Block motorists' views of vehicles at public right-of-way intersections; or (c) Interfere with persons entering or exiting parked cars.

Portable signs may not be displayed from vehicles parked in front of or adjacent to the businesses, whether on public or private property. This includes banners affixed to a vehicle. The portable sign should be stabilized so as to withstand wind gusts or should be removed during windy conditions.

Portable signs should be designed to incorporate the colors, textures, and features of the building in front of which they are to be placed. Signs made of plywood, pressboard, or paper products are not permitted; signs made of metal, burnished wood, or other materials having a natural appearance are allowed. Finishes should be of high quality and durable.

Portable signs should also be removed from their outdoor location at the close of each business day. When a permit application is approved, an official city tag will be placed on the sign showing permit approval.

NEON SIGNS

Except for one single "open" sign, all neon signs (i.e., exposed gas-filled lighting tubes) are prohibited. A permitted "open" sign cannot exceed 18" x 24".

TEMPORARY SIGN BANNERS

Banners may be displayed for a period of either 30 or 60 consecutive calendar days, with a maximum display period of 180 calendar days per calendar year. Multiple display periods are permitted on a banner permit, provided that the total amount of display days doesn't exceed 180 per calendar year. Only one banner sign is allowed to be displayed, except where a single business occupies a building located at the intersection of two major streets, in which case one banner sign may be displayed on each side of the building facing on the major street.

When a new business first opens to the public, a temporary "Open for Business" sign may be displayed for a maximum period of not more than 60 days, with the approved banner permit. There is no charge for an "Open for Business" banner permit.

PROHIBITED SIGNS

The following types of signs and other advertising devices are prohibited:

- Animated signs
- Balloon signs (with some exceptions)
- Pennants and flags (unless approved as part of a special events permit)
- Emitting signs (emit sound, color or visible matter, e.g., smoke or steam)
- Projecting signs
- Roof signs and pole signs
- Vehicle mounted signs
- · Light bulb strings (except for holiday decorations)
- Signs pertaining to a home business occupation
- Signs on public property

If you are planning to install a new sign or make a change to an existing sign, you may obtain an application for a sign permit from the Planning Division. For more information, please contact staff at (626) 308-2806. español

helped showcase San Gabriel and welcome the public to our great city! We look forward to another great event in 2007! You are invited to become part of San Gabriel and Los Angeles' shared, living history by joining the Walk to Los Angeles on Sunday, September 2. Beginning at 7 a.m. at San Gabriel Mission, walkers head west for nine miles along Mission Road and are greeted with a warm Los Angeles welcome as well as festivities at El Pueblo Plaza (Olvera Street) in Los Angeles. The Walk takes approximately three hours to complete and free transportation from Olvera Street to the Mission will be provided.

The founding of Los Angeles came 10 years after San Gabriel Mission Archangel was founded in 1771 as the fourth mission established in the chain of 21 California missions. The Walk reenacts the original settlers' final nine-mile trek from San Gabriel Mission to the Los Angeles River, where, on September 4, 1781, they founded El Pueblo de la Reina de Los Angeles.

If walking nine miles is too strenuous, then take time over the Labor Day weekend to enjoy the Mission's 236th La Fiesta de San Gabriel. Thousands of people from Los Angeles and Orange counties attend the three-day Fiesta from Friday, August 31 through Sunday, September 2 to view the restored mission, museum and mission grounds - and to see and experience our beautiful historic San Gabriel Mission District.

MTA Recommends City Receive \$2.5 Million for **Street Projects**

The Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transit Authority (MTA) has recommended that San Gabriel receive more than \$2.5 million for various street improvement projects. MTA funds a wide array of transportation projects including bikeways and pedestrian facilities, local roads and highway improvements, and serves as transportation planner and coordinator, designer, builder and operator for all of Los Angeles County.

Pending MTA approval, tentatively slated for the end of this month, this would represent the largest single funding recommendation the City has ever received through the "Call for Projects" process. Four of the City's six projects submitted by the Engineering Division received funding; all four are recommended for the full level requested.

The projects pending approval by the MTA include:
